1	Trastevere	Trastevere is the 13th rione of Rome, on the west bank of the Tiber, south of Vatican City. Its name comes from the Latin trans Tiberim, meaning literally "beyond the Tiber".	 <p>What is a number of a tram going from Trastevere to Piazza Venezia?</p>	
2	Largo di Torre Argentina	Largo di Torre Argentina is a square in Rome, Italy, that hosts four Republican Roman temples, and the remains of Pompey's Theatre. It is located in the ancient Campus Martius.	 <p>What animals have the shelter there?</p>	

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3	Piazza San Pietro and St. Peter's Basilica	<p>Saint Peter's is a massive plaza located directly in front of St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican City, the papal enclave surrounded by Rome, directly west of the neighborhood or rione of Borgo. At the center of the square is a four-thousand-year-old Egyptian obelisk, erected at the current site in 1568.</p>	 <p>How much costs an entrance to St. Peter's Basilica?</p>	
4	The Cupola of St Peter's Basilica	<p>There are two choices when it comes to getting to the top of the Cupola or Dome of St Peter's. You can get a lift/elevator up to the roof level and climb the remaining steps to the top of the Dome or you can climb all the steps from the ground up (312 in all). Whichever way you choose to go the effort expended will be deemed well worth it. The views are spectacular.</p>	 <p>How much do you pay for a lift?</p>	

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5	Castel Sant'Angelo	<p>The Mausoleum of Hadrian, usually known as Castel Sant'Angelo (English: Castle of the Holy Angel), is a towering cylindrical building in Parco Adriano, Rome, Italy. It was initially commissioned by the Roman Emperor Hadrian as a mausoleum for himself and his family. The building was later used by the popes as a fortress and castle, and is now a museum.</p>	 <p>What is a name of the bridge which leads to the Castel Sant'Angelo?</p>	
6	Italian cuisine	<p>Italian cuisine is characterized by its extreme simplicity, with many dishes having only four to eight ingredients. Well known due to usage of a diverse variety of pasta including noodles in various lengths, widths and shapes. Distinguished on shapes they are named penne, maccheroni, spaghetti, linguine, fusilli, lasagne and many more varieties filled with other ingredients like ravioli and tortellini.</p>	 <p>What is the name of another very popular dish?</p>	

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7	Piazza Navona	Piazza Navona is a city square in Rome, Italy. It is built on the site of the Stadium of Domitian, built in 1st century AD, and follows the form of the open space of the stadium. The ancient Romans came there to watch the agones ("games"). It is believed that over time the name changed to 'in avone' to 'navone' and eventually to 'navona'.	 <p>How many fountains are there?</p>	
8	Pantheon	The Pantheon is a building commissioned by Marcus Agrippa during the reign of Augustus as a temple to all the gods of ancient Rome. It has been in continuous use throughout its history, and since the 7th century, the Pantheon has been used as a Roman Catholic church dedicated to "St. Mary and the Martyrs" but informally known as "Santa Maria della Rotonda	 <p>What is the name square in front of the Pantheon?</p>
